BOARD DECIDES TO RETIRE "BRAVES" MONIKER

LEGACY COUNCIL NEWS

A year ago, BBHS Legacy Council students contacted school administration with concerns over the impact of the "Braves" moniker. Then, over the summer they sent a letter to Seattle Clear Sky Native Youth Council seeking feedback on the school's moniker use. In November, BBHS formed a Moniker Committee to look into the issue further. Legacy Council students were involved in many of the meetings and work to address this issue, and on June 8th, the school's Board of Directors announced a change from the "Braves" moniker to something yet to be determined. 
